READ THIS BEFORE YOU BID

Five things every vintage buyer should know

If you take nothing else from this guide, take these. They're the difference between buying smart and getting burned.

01 The high numbers are where the value hides

Through the mid-1970s, Topps printed the last series of each set in smaller quantities because production ended as kids moved on to football. Those “high numbers” are scarcer and worth more than low numbers from the same set, even for common players. Learn each year's high-number range (there's a full map in the back).

02 Centering is the whole ballgame

Two cards can share the same grade and sell for wildly different money. A well-centered, sharp copy — strong “eye appeal” — beats a technically-equal card that barely made grade. On chronically miscut cards ('79 Ozzie, '80 Rickey), pay up for centered and walk away from 70/30.

03 Buy the key cards graded

The most valuable vintage cards are also the most counterfeited: '52 Mantle, '54 Aaron, '55 Clemente, '63 Rose, '68 Ryan. For anything with real value, buy it in a PSA or SGC holder. A raw “bargain” on a key card is usually a bargain for a reason.

04 Colored borders chip — grade accordingly

1962's wood grain and 1971's black borders show every tick of wear along the edges. A high-grade example of either is a genuine trophy. When you find one clean, it's worth far more than the price guide suggests.

05 The story is part of the value

A 1974 card that says “Washington” for a team that never moved. A 1976 Oscar Gamble afro the Yankees made him cut. These aren't just cards...they're conversations. Knowing the story is how you buy well and sell better.

HOW TO READ EACH SET

Every set entry follows the same four beats, so you always know where to look:

1950S

1951 Topps — Before the Beginning



THE SET: Red Backs and Blue Backs of 52-card miniature sets (2" × 2⁵/₈") designed as a playing-card game. Plus two rare 11-card All-Star sets and nine team photo cards.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: The Connie Mack All-Stars subset is a HOF roster by itself with Babe Ruth, Christy Mathewson, Honus Wagner, and other legends (curiously NOT Ty Cobb). The Current All-Stars and Red/Blue Backs include stars like Yogi Berra, Robin Roberts, and Richie Ashburn.

ROOKIE CARDS: No marquee rookies as this is a pre-flagship novelty issue, not a comprehensive set.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Blue Backs are scarcer than Red Backs (commons ~\$15–20 vs. cheaper Red Backs). Red Back team-change variations exist for Tommy Holmes and Gus Zernial. The Major League All-Stars (Current) set is rarer still — the three short prints (Konstanty, Roberts, Stanky) are among the rarest Topps cards ever made. **Story:** The game-card concept flopped against Bowman's full-color cards — which is exactly why Topps went big and bold in 1952. The failure of 1951 created the masterpiece of 1952.

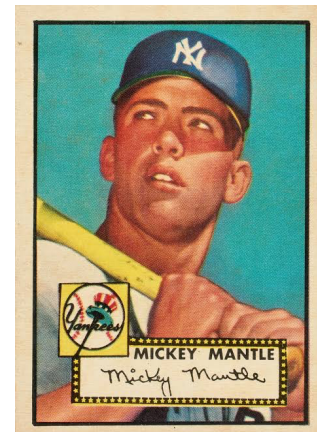
1952 Topps — The Set That Built the Hobby

THE SET: 407 cards, 2⁵/₈" × 3³/₄" (oversized), six series. First Topps set with stats and bio on back. Designed by Sy Berger on his kitchen table in Brooklyn.

Series scarcity (critical for buying):

- Series 1 (#1–80): exists with BOTH red backs and black backs. Black backs carry a 10–15% premium and are scarcer.
- Series 3 (#131–190): white stock; gray-back versions exist and are rare (~3x premium).
- Series 5 (#251–310): somewhat scarce. Cards #281–300 single-printed (except #289 Holmes, #295 Cavarretta, #296 Rolfe).
- Series 6 "high numbers" (#311–407): legendary scarcity — 94 single prints, 3 double prints (#311–313).

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: A murderers' row — Jackie Robinson (#312), Willie Mays (#261, 2nd-year), Eddie Mathews (#407 RC), Pee Wee Reese (#333), Roy Campanella, Yogi Berra (#191), Warren Spahn, Robin Roberts, Hoyt Wilhelm (#392 RC), Bob Lemon, Early Wynn, Monte Irvin, Johnny Mize, Enos Slaughter, Phil Rizzuto, Duke Snider (#37). And the icon: Mickey Mantle #311.



ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Eddie Mathews #407** — last card in the set, a condition nightmare, HOF third baseman.
- **Hoyt Wilhelm #392** — HOF knuckleballer, first reliever in Cooperstown.
- **Billy Martin #175** — not a HOFer but a beloved/notorious manager later.
- Note: **Mantle #311 is NOT a rookie** — it's his second-year card (true RC is 1951 Bowman #253). Same for Mays (#261, true RC 1951 Bowman #305) and Robinson (#312, true RC 1948 Leaf).

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY:

- #48 Joe Page / #49 Johnny Sain: error versions with each other's backs swapped (~4x).
- #311 Mantle Type 1 vs Type 2: double-printed with two distinct types (nameplate borders, "ledge" overhang, back-stitching direction). Not graded as official variations but advanced collectors care.
- #307 Frank Campos: black-star back variation (~100x — a great rarity).
- #391 Ben Chapman: photo is actually Sam Chapman.
- #1 Andy Pafko: first card, lived atop rubber-banded stacks — high-grade copies are extreme condition rarities; the black-back Pafko is "off the charts tough."
- **The ocean story (tell this on stream):** Sixth-series cases sat unsold as kids turned to football. Around 1960, Sy Berger loaded a reported 400–500 cases onto a garbage scow and dumped them into the Atlantic off New Jersey. Hundreds of thousands of Mantles, Robinsons, and Mathews rookies sleep with the fishes — the single decision that created the '52 high-number scarcity.

1953 Topps — The Painted Set

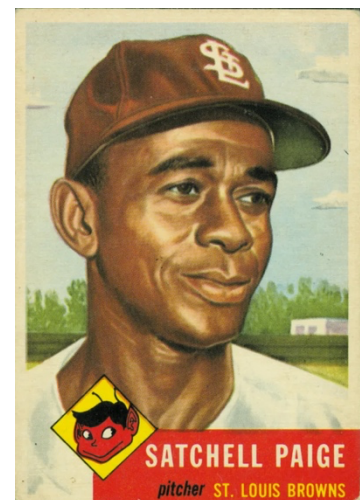
THE SET: 274 cards, large format. Hand-painted portraits from photographs. Numbers #253, 261, 267, 268, 271, 275 were never issued (Bowman contract disputes).

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#82, his only painted Topps card), Jackie Robinson (#1), Roy Campanella (#27), Satchel Paige (#244), Whitey Ford, Yogi Berra, Warren Spahn, Eddie Mathews, Duke Snider, Pee Wee Reese, Hoyt Wilhelm, Larry Doby, Monte Irvin.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Johnny Podres #263** — high-series RC; 1955 World Series hero who finally beat the Yankees for Brooklyn.
- **Jim Gilliam #258** — Dodgers fixture, ROY '53.
- Note: Whitey Ford's first Topps card is here, but his **true RC is 1951 Bowman**.

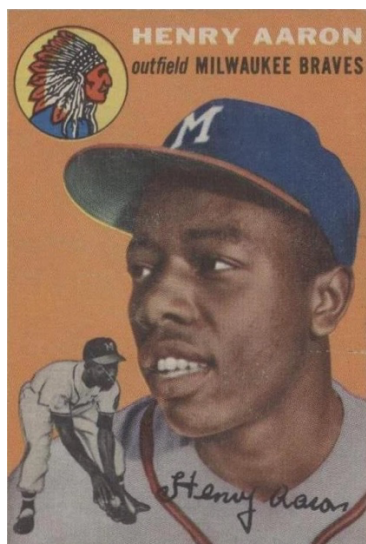
VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: ~80 documented variations; the major one is bio text in BLACK or WHITE print on cards #10, #44, #61, #72, #81, and #86–165 (black-print ~20% premium). Short prints in the final series (#221–280) are tougher. **Story:** The Paige card misspells his name "Satchell" on the front. Paige was 46, still effective for the St. Louis Browns (3.07 ERA in '52) — Bill Veeck signed him partly as a gate draw. It's the only mainstream Topps card of the Negro Leagues legend. **The Bowman war** peaks in '53 — both companies signing players to exclusives and suing each other, which is why stars bounce between checklists '53–'55.



1954 Topps — Two Photos, Three Legends

THE SET: 250 cards. Dual-image design (portrait + action) on bold solid color backgrounds. NO Mickey Mantle — Bowman had him under exclusive contract in '54-'55.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Ted Williams (#1 AND #250 — bookending the set), Hank Aaron (RC), Ernie Banks (RC), Al Kaline (RC), Jackie Robinson, Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford, Duke Snider, Warren Spahn, Eddie Mathews, Larry Doby, Bob Lemon, Nellie Fox, George Kell.



ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Hank Aaron #128** — one of the most important rookie cards in the hobby.
- **Ernie Banks #94** — Mr. Cub's debut.
- **Al Kaline #201** — Mr. Tiger, 3,000 hits, 18-time All-Star.
- **Tommy Lasorda #132** — cult-classic RC; a wild lefty (0-4 career) who became a HOF manager.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Cards #1-50 exist with gray backs (~2x+ premium); ~50 total variations per Dick Gilkeson's research.

Stories: Aaron's portrait shows a 19-year-old two years removed from the Negro Leagues (Indianapolis Clowns); he signed with the Braves for \$50/month more than the Giants offered — match it, and Aaron and Mays share an outfield. Banks went straight from the Kansas City Monarchs to the Cubs with no minor-league time. Williams bookending the set (first AND last card) was Topps' statement of war after signing him away from Bowman.

1955 Topps — Horizontal History

THE SET: 206 cards, first all-horizontal Topps design. Numbers #175, 186, 203, 209 never issued (Bowman casualties). Last year of the oversized format.

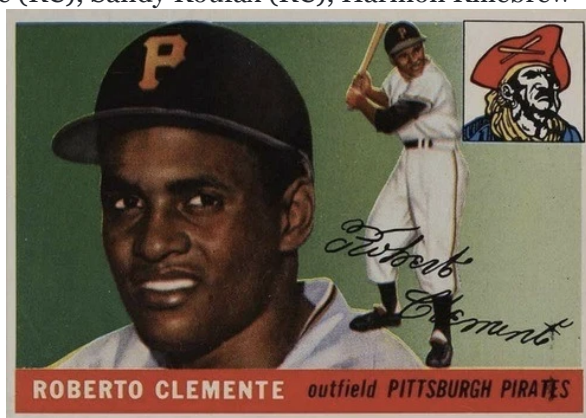
HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Roberto Clemente (RC), Sandy Koufax (RC), Harmon Killebrew (RC), Willie Mays (#194), Ted Williams (#2), Duke Snider (#210, last card), Yogi Berra, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Hoyt Wilhelm, Whitey Ford.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Roberto Clemente #164** — notoriously hard to find centered due to the horizontal cut.
- **Sandy Koufax #123** — frequently faked; buy graded only.
- **Harmon Killebrew #124** — HOF slugger, 573 career HR.

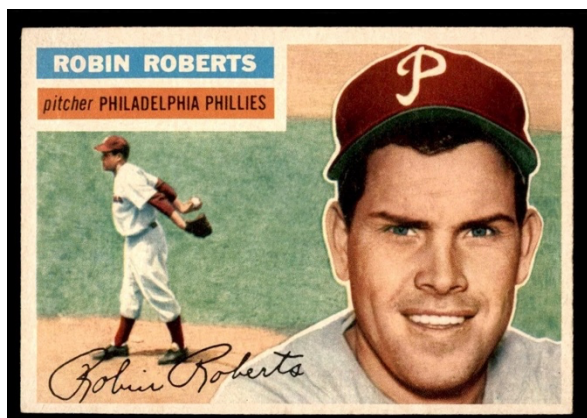
VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Only 2 documented variations — one of the cleanest sets ever printed (#137 Harry Elliott and #177 Jim Robertson minor back-text).

Stories: Clemente was a Rule 5 pick — the Dodgers signed him and hid him in Montreal; Pirates GM Branch Rickey (who'd signed Jackie Robinson) knew and took him for \$4,000. Koufax was a 19-year-old "bonus baby" forced onto the MLB roster, wild for six years, then 1961-66 the most dominant pitcher alive before retiring at 30 with an arthritic elbow. Killebrew, another bonus baby, was signed off an Idaho semipro field at 17 after a U.S. Senator tipped off the Senators.



1956 Topps — The Variation Goldmine

THE SET: 340 cards plus 2 unnumbered checklists. Horizontal, portrait + action art. First Topps team cards. Final year of the large format. Topps bought Bowman in early '56.



HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#135), Jackie Robinson (#30, his final Topps card), Roberto Clemente (#33), Hank Aaron (#31), Sandy Koufax (#79), Luis Aparicio (RC), Willie Mays, Ted Williams, Yogi Berra (#110), Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Duke Snider, Whitey Ford, Warren Spahn, Bob Feller.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Luis Aparicio #292** — HOF shortstop, "Little Looie," AL ROY '56. Often available in PSA 8 for reasonable money.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: 206

documented variations (most of any 1950s set). Cards #1–180 exist with WHITE or GRAY backs (gray first, white later); PSA designates them separately — a master set is a monster project. Team cards exist in THREE front variations: dated "1955," name centered (undated), name left (undated) — dated versions ~2–2.5x. The two unnumbered checklists are condition rarities. Also chase the league-president cards (#1 William Harridge, #2 Warren Giles — tough first/second position cards). **Story:** The Robinson #30 is a farewell card; the art shows him barreling into a fielder. He was traded to the Giants in December '56 and retired rather than report. Sell it with the story.

1957 Topps — The Modern Card Is Born

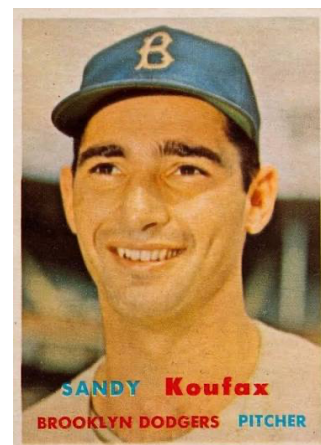
THE SET: 407 cards at the NEW standard size — 2½" × 3½" (still standard today). First real color photography instead of paintings. The scarce "middle series" (#265–352) is the toughest run — a quirk unique to '57.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#95), Brooks Robinson (RC), Frank Robinson (RC), Don Drysdale (RC), Bill Mazeroski (RC), Sandy Koufax (#302), Roberto Clemente (#76), Hank Aaron (#20), Willie Mays, Ted Williams, Yogi Berra, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Warren Spahn, Whitey Ford, Duke Snider.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Brooks Robinson #328** — in the tough middle series, so scarcer than Frank's; HOF "Human Vacuum Cleaner."
- **Frank Robinson #35** — HOF, only player MVP in both leagues.
- **Don Drysdale #18** — HOF Dodgers ace.
- **Bill Mazeroski #24** — HOF second baseman, 1960 WS walk-off legend.

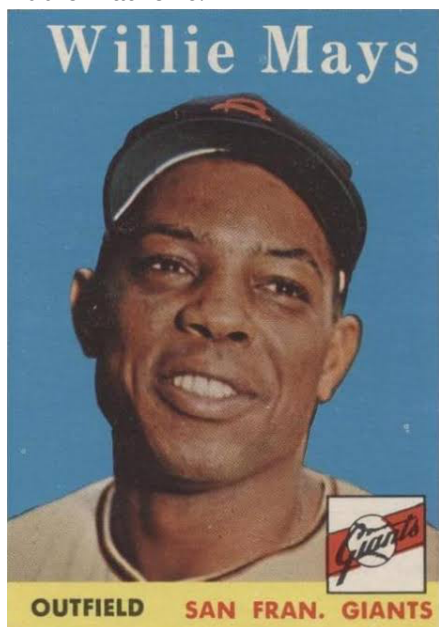
VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Essentially no base variations (1 documented), but the four unnumbered checklists are brutal rarities. Also chase #400 Dodgers' Sluggers (Furillo/Hodges/Campanella/Snider) and #407 Mantle/Berra "Yankees' Power Hitters" (last card). **Stories:** The Aaron #20 reversed-negative shows the most feared right-handed hitter of his era batting lefty — never fixed, so the "error" IS the card. The Mantle #95 "ghost" — a faint double-exposure from early color photography that hobby lore has never identified.



1958 Topps — Yellow Letters and a Missing Card

THE SET: 494 cards — but #145 was NEVER PRINTED (Ed Bouchee suspension). Solid color backgrounds. First "Sport Magazine All-Star" subset. First Stan Musial Topps card (#476 All-Star).

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#150), Hank Aaron (#30), Willie Mays (#5), Stan Musial (#476, first Topps card), Orlando Cepeda (RC), Roger Maris (RC — not HOF but iconic), Ernie Banks, Ted Williams, Roberto Clemente, Sandy Koufax, Al Kaline, Yogi Berra, Warren Spahn, Eddie Mathews.



ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Roger Maris #47** — not a HOFer, but the 61-homer icon; a perennial top demand card.
- **Orlando Cepeda #343** — HOF "Baby Bull," NL ROY '58.
- **Curt Flood #464** — not HOF, but historically huge (free-agency pioneer).

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: 33 cards have YELLOW letter variations (14 yellow team name, 19 yellow player name) vs. standard white — premiums often 3–10x, one of the most collected variation runs in the hobby (#30 Aaron yellow-letter is a major chase). Also chase #418 World Series Batting Foes (Mantle/Aaron together, shot at the '57 Series). **Stories:** Maris in '58 was an unheralded Cleveland kid soon shipped to Kansas City (a glorified Yankees farm team); the Yankees grabbed him in December '59, and the steroid era later made his "pure" 61 feel demand-proof. Curt Flood's refusal of a 1969 trade ("I am not a piece of property to be bought and sold") cracked open free agency — a card for history buffs, not just collectors.

1959 Topps — The Circles

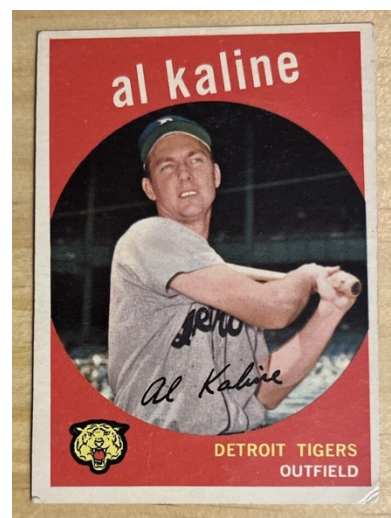
THE SET: 572 cards (biggest yet), circular photo frames on colored backgrounds. High numbers #507–572 are scarce with distinctive pink/red backs.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#10), Willie Mays (#50), Hank Aaron (#380), Roberto Clemente (#478), Bob Gibson (RC), Sparky Anderson (RC, as player), Ernie Banks, Ted Williams, Sandy Koufax, Al Kaline, Yogi Berra, Warren Spahn, Eddie Mathews, Harmon Killebrew.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Bob Gibson #514** — high-number HOF rookie; the key RC of the set.
- **Sparky Anderson #338** — his playing-days RC; later a HOF manager.
- Note: **McCovey is NOT here as a rookie** — he debuted July '59 and his RC is 1960 Topps #316.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: 96 documented variations, mostly early-series "optioned"/trade-line and #92 Dave Philley types; several checklist variations. Also chase #212 Fence Busters (Aaron/Mathews) and #321 Bob Cerv. **Story:** Gibson's smiling rookie photo is the most misleading in the hobby — he was the fiercest competitor of his era (hit 102 batters, wouldn't speak to opponents even at All-Star Games), and his 1.12 ERA in 1968 forced MLB to lower the mound five inches. They changed the geometry of the sport because of him.



1960S

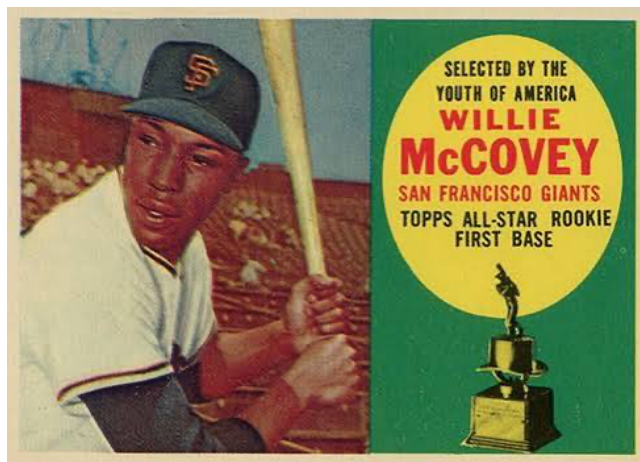
1960 Topps — Horizontal Again

THE SET: 572 cards, all-horizontal design. Introduced the Topps All-Star Rookie Team trophy cards. High numbers #507–572 scarce.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#350), Carl Yastrzemski (RC), Willie McCovey (RC), Roberto Clemente (#326), Bob Gibson (#73, 2nd year), Willie Mays, Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, Sandy Koufax, Al Kaline, Yogi Berra, Warren Spahn, Harmon Killebrew, Eddie Mathews.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Carl Yastrzemski #148** — HOF, Triple Crown '67, 3,000 hits/400 HR.
- **Willie McCovey #316** — HOF "Stretch," All-Rookie trophy card; won ROY unanimously after hitting .354 in 52 games.
- **Jim Kaat** — long-career lefty, recent HOF inductee.

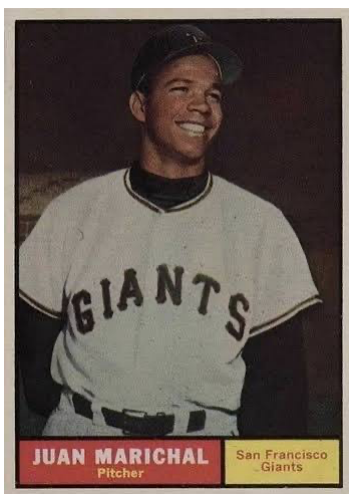


VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: ~25 documented variations, mostly gray/white-back checklist runs. Also chase the All-Star high numbers #563 Mantle / #564 Mays. **Story:** The '60 set is chronically undervalued — strong design, two legit HOF rookies, prices well below '59 and '61. For a dealer, a set to buy.

1961 Topps — The Most-Graded Set Ever

THE SET: 587 cards, clean minimal design. PSA has graded more 1961 Topps than any other set (395,000+), driven by the MVP and All-Star subsets. High numbers #523–589 are genuinely scarce.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#300), Carl Yastrzemski (#287, 2nd year), Juan Marichal (RC), Billy Williams (RC), Ron Santo (RC), Willie Mays (#150/#517), Hank Aaron, Roberto Clemente, Bob Gibson, Willie McCovey, Sandy Koufax, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Warren Spahn, Harmon Killebrew.



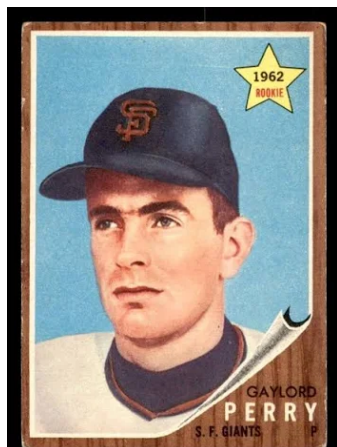
ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Juan Marichal #417** — HOF "Dominican Dandy," one of the finest pitchers of the decade.
- **Billy Williams #141** — HOF "Sweet Swingin' Billy," NL ROY '61.
- **Ron Santo #35** — HOF Cubs third baseman.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Chase #2 Roger Maris (the 61-homer year!), #406 Mantle "Blasts 565 ft. Home Run" Baseball Thrills, the #475–486 MVP subset, and #578 Mantle All-Star (brutal high number). **Story:** THE Maris year — he and Mantle chased Ruth's 61 all summer; the press wanted Mantle, not the quiet outsider. Maris's hair fell out in clumps from stress. He hit 61 on the season's final day into a half-empty Yankee Stadium. Any '61 Maris sells on that story.

1962 Topps — Wood Grain and Green Tint

THE SET: 598 cards, the famous wood-grain border (chips brutally — a major condition-rarity set). First "In Action"-style multi-player specials, Babe Ruth Special subset (#135–144).



HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#200/#318/#471), Roberto Clemente (#10), Lou Brock (RC), Gaylord Perry (RC), Willie Mays, Hank Aaron, Sandy Koufax, Bob Gibson, Willie McCovey, Carl Yastrzemski, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Harmon Killebrew, Warren Spahn, Juan Marichal, Billy Williams.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Lou Brock #387** — HOF, 938 career steals, the Cubs' infamous trade-away.
- **Gaylord Perry #199** — HOF spitballer, 314 wins.
- **Bob Uecker #594** — high-number RC; not HOF as a player but "sells on personality forever" (Mr. Baseball).
- **Joe Torre** — HOF (as manager); his early-career card era.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: The GREEN TINT run — a chunk of Series 2 (#110–196) exists in normal and greenish second-printing versions (Bill Skowron #110 etc., tough and collected hard). Eight numbers feature entirely different player images between printings. #139 has FOUR versions (two Hal Reniff poses + two Babe Ruth "Babe Hits 60" Specials, dirt vs. grass). #142 Ruth Special has a "coaching for the Dodgers" variation. **Story:** Brock's rookie shows a Cub; the June 1964 trade to St. Louis for Ernie Broglio is maybe the most lopsided ever — Brock hit .348 the rest of '64, won the Series, stole 938 bases; Broglio won seven more games his whole career.

1963 Topps — Rose Arrives

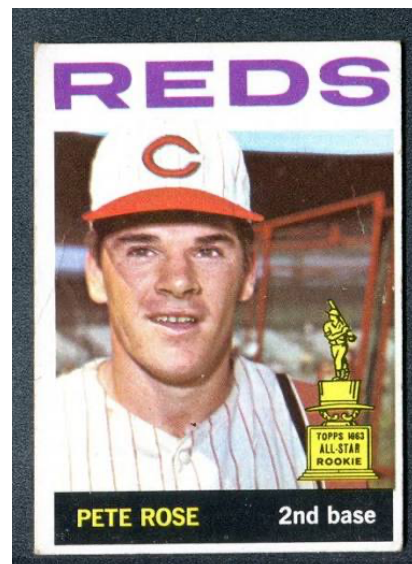
THE SET: 576 cards, dual-photo design (large color + small B&W inset), colored bottom band. High numbers tough.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#200), Hank Aaron (#390), Roberto Clemente (#540), Sandy Koufax (#210), Carl Yastrzemski (#115), Willie Stargell (RC), Willie Mays, Bob Gibson, Willie McCovey, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Harmon Killebrew, Warren Spahn, Juan Marichal, Lou Brock, Billy Williams, Tony Oliva (RC).

ROOKIE CARDS:

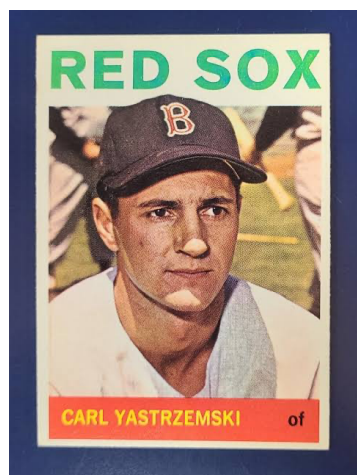
- **Pete Rose #537** — the key card; shared "Rookie Stars" card (with Pedro Gonzalez, Ken McMullen, Al Weis). Not HOF (banned), but a market cornerstone. Most counterfeited '60s card — never buy raw.
- **Willie Stargell #553** — HOF "Pops," chronically undervalued.
- **Tony Oliva** — "Tony O," recent HOF inductee.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Checklist/print variations; the #54 Rookie Stars "1963" vs "1962 Rookie Stars" date variation is the famous one. **Stories:** Mantle nicknamed Rose "Charlie Hustle" as an INSULT after he sprinted to first on a walk in spring training; Rose wore it as a badge — 4,256 hits, permanent gambling ban. Stargell hit 475 homers (some of the longest ever measured) and captained the '79 "We Are Family" Pirates to a title at 39.



1964 Topps — Clean and Completable

THE SET: 587 cards, big bold team name across the top. Well-printed, widely available — a great first vintage set and a dealer flip set.



HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#50), Hank Aaron (#300), Willie Mays (#423), Phil Niekro (RC), Roberto Clemente, Sandy Koufax, Bob Gibson, Willie McCovey, Carl Yastrzemski, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Harmon Killebrew, Lou Brock, Willie Stargell, Billy Williams, Juan Marichal, Tony Oliva.

ROOKIE CARDS:

- **Phil Niekro #541** — HOF knuckleballer, 318 wins; undervalued.
- **Tony Conigliaro #146** — not HOF, but a great "what if" RC.
- **Dick Allen #243** — listed as "Richie"; HOF (Class of 2025). The name on his cards is its own civil-rights-era story.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Chase #125 Rose (2nd year, heavily counterfeited), #331 AL Bombers (Mantle/Maris/Kaline/Cash), #423 "Tops in NL" (Aaron/Mays).

Story: Tony C — local Boston kid, 24 HR at 19, youngest AL home-run champ ever at 20. An August 1967 Jack Hamilton fastball shattered his cheekbone and damaged his retina; two comebacks, then his eyesight failed. One of the great "what if" cards.

1965 Topps — Pennants and the Brutal Highs

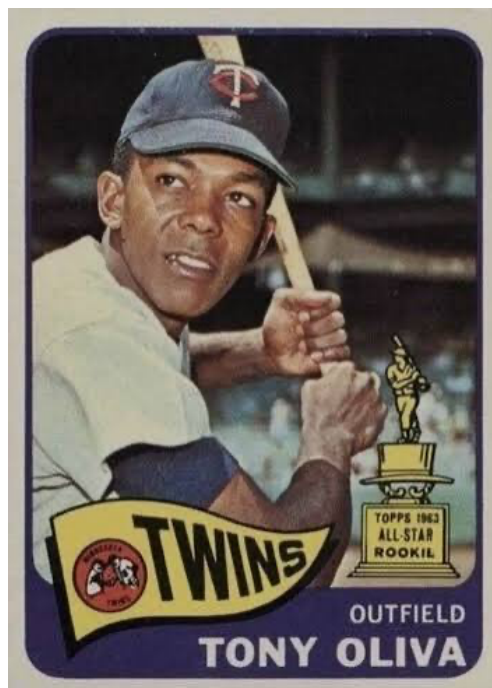
THE SET: 598 cards, team-pennant design (one of the most beloved). High numbers (#523–598) among the toughest of the decade.

HALL OF FAMERS IN THE SET: Mickey Mantle (#350), Roberto Clemente (#160), Hank Aaron (#170), Sandy Koufax (#300), Steve Carlton (RC), Joe Morgan (RC), Tony Perez (RC), Catfish Hunter (RC), Willie Mays, Bob Gibson, Willie McCovey, Carl Yastrzemski, Ernie Banks, Al Kaline, Harmon Killebrew, Lou Brock, Willie Stargell.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Chase #533 Mets Rookies (Tug McGraw et al., high number). **Story:** Carlton refused to speak to the press for ~15 years, letting his slider talk. In 1972 he won 27 games for a 59-win Phillies team — 46% of their wins, maybe the greatest pitching season relative to team quality ever.

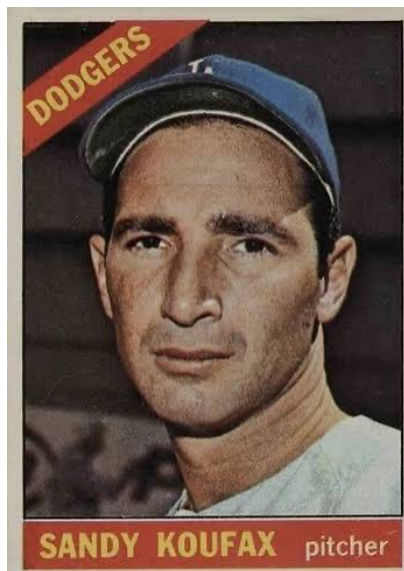
THE SET: 598 cards, clean white design with the diagonal team-name corner. The condition story is the BRUTAL high series (#523–598), many short-printed — among the rarest postwar commons. (Note: black borders are 1971, NOT 1966 — a common mix-up.)

He later modeled underwear — pair the rookie with a Jockey ad for a guaranteed stream laugh.



1967 Topps — Seaver and the Hardest Highs

THE SET: 609 cards (largest yet), clean design, big photos. The high series (#534–609) is arguably THE toughest postwar high-number run, full of SPs.

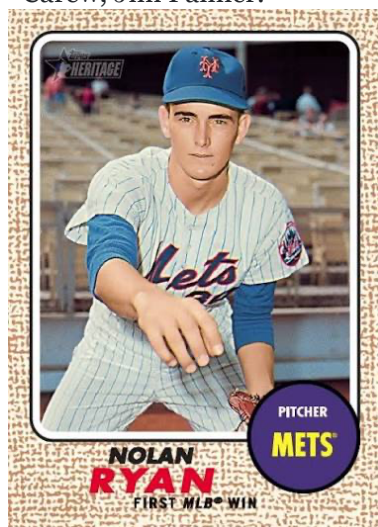

- **Nolan Ryan #177** — shared with Jerry Koosman; one of the most important rookie cards in the hobby. Seven no-hitters, 5,714 K. Most counterfeited '60s card after the Rose — buy graded.
- **Johnny Bench #247** — shared with Ron Tompkins; HOF, redefined catching.

VARIATIONS, CHASE & STORY: Minor checklist variations; the Ryan/Koosman has print batches that matter to graders (centering is chronically poor — left-right shift is the rule). Chase #490 "Super Stars" (Mantle/Mays/Killebrew — the only front pairing of Mantle AND Mays in their careers). **Story:** Ted Williams signed a ball for rookie Bench: "To Johnny Bench, a Hall of Famer for sure." He was right.

1969 Topps — White Letters and Last Cards

THE SET: 664 cards. Mantle's final card. Expansion year (Padres, Expos, Pilots, Royals) = airbrushing everywhere.

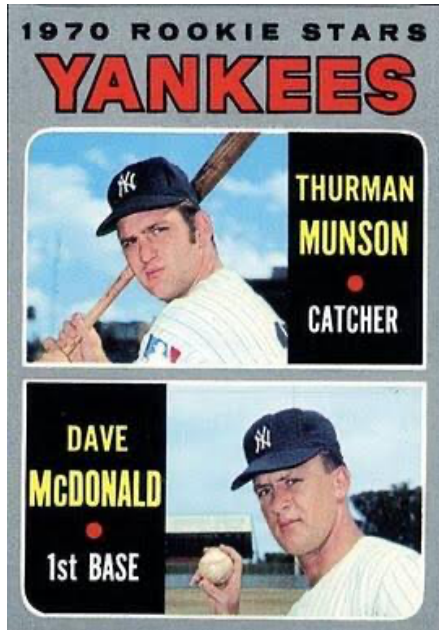

1970 Topps — Gray Borders, Big Set

THE SET: 720 cards (biggest yet), gray borders that hide wear. All Brewers appear as Seattle Pilots (the only flagship cards of a one-year franchise). First year with no Mantle since 1951.

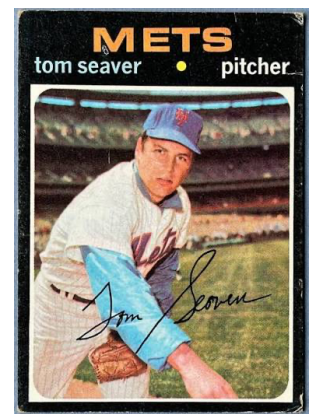

A '71 high-number star in NM is rarer than price guides suggest. The set where "pack-fresh" actually means something.



1972 Topps — Psychedelic Madness

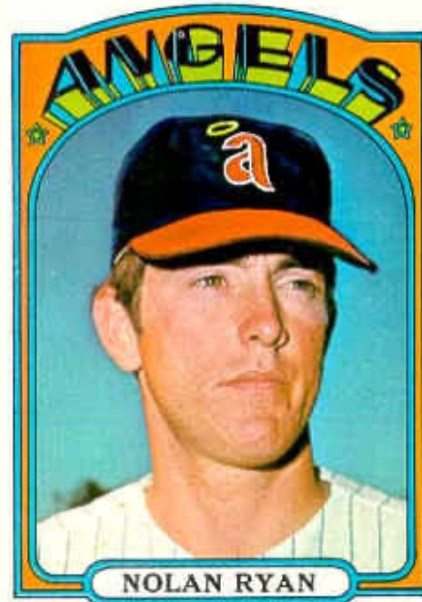

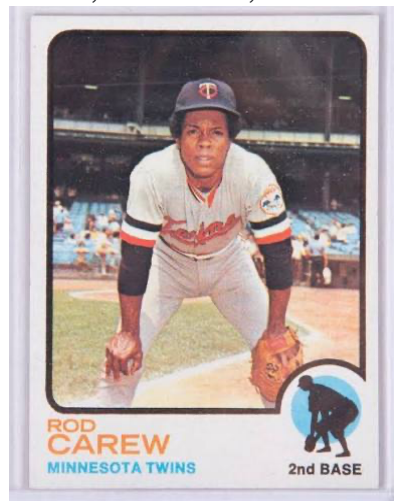

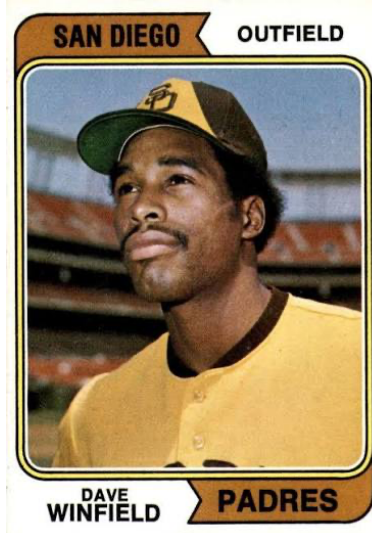

Key: #250 McCovey (the HOF Washington), plus #32 Grubb, #53 Kendall, #102 Greif, #148 Hilton, #173 Jones, #197 Romo, #226 team card, #241 Beckert, #364 Gaston, #387 Morales, and #599 Rookie Pitchers (three versions). **Story:** Winfield was drafted by FOUR teams in THREE sports — MLB, NBA (Hawks), ABA (Utah Stars), and NFL (Vikings, despite never playing college football).

1975 Topps — Color Riot + The Mini

THE SET: 660 cards, two-tone color-combo borders (the most colorful Topps ever). The '75 MINI is a ~20%-smaller parallel test-marketed in Michigan and select West Coast areas — minis run ~3–5x regular versions. Real minis measure $2\frac{1}{4}" \times 3\frac{1}{8}"$ (watch for trimmed regulars faked as minis).

Herb Washington (#407) has the only card ever labeled "PINCH RUNNER" — a world-class sprinter Charlie Finley signed who played 105 games without ever batting, pitching, or fielding.

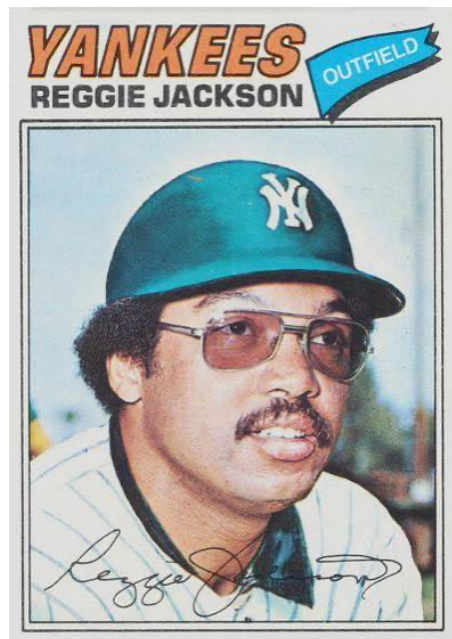

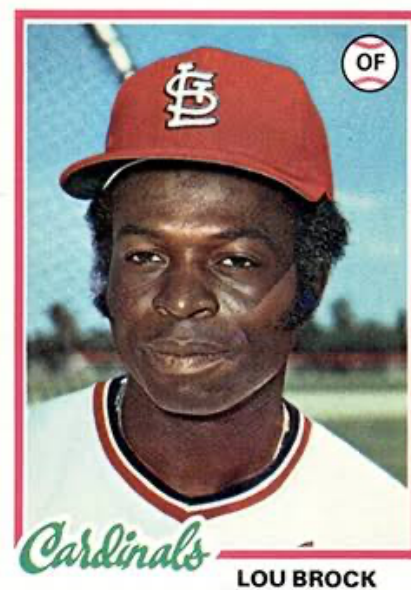

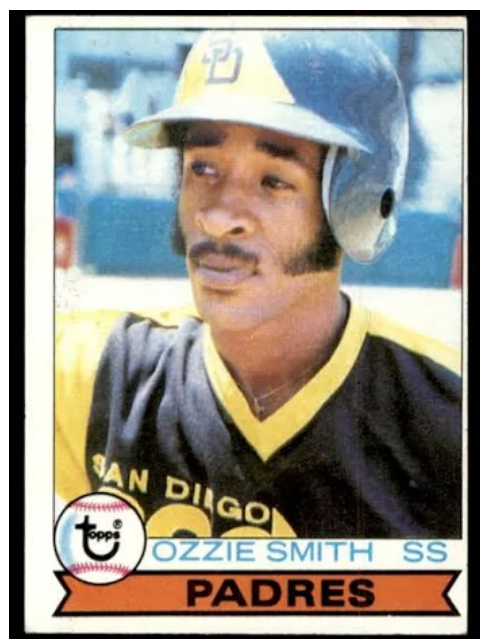
